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Joe Morton Stars in the Wallis Annenberg Center for the Performing Arts' Production of a Radical Reinvention of Shakespeare's KING LEAR Directed by John Gould Rubin

Theatrically Adventurous Production, with Full Score, Videos, and Projections That Transform the Theater into a Not-Too-Distant-Future World Ravaged by Environmental Catastrophes

(Beverly Hills, CA, UPDATED May 15, 2022) – The Wallis Annenberg Center for the Performing Arts presents a radical reinvention of Shakespeare's KING LEAR, starring Emmy® Award and NAACP Image Award winner Joe Morton (ABC's "Scandal," the legendary Brother from Another Planet, Netflix's "The Politician," Justice League) and directed by John Gould Rubin, opening Saturday, May 14 and running through Sunday, June 5, 2022, in The Wallis' Bram Goldsmith Theater. This theatrically adventurous production of perhaps the greatest play in English literature features original music, videos, and projections that will transform the theater into a not-too-distantfuture United States ravaged by environmental catastrophes. Joining Morton in the cast are Mark Harelik (The Normal Heart on Broadway, Trumbo, "The Morning Show," "Star Trek Voyager") as Gloucester; River Gallo (GLAAD Media Rising Star Award, PONYBOI) as Cordelia and Fool; Zach Solomon ("Better Things") as Edgar and King of France; Brie Eley ("9-1-1," "The Goldbergs," "Saved by the Bell") as Regan; Emily Swallow ("The Mandalorian," "The Mentalist") as Goneril; Rafael Jordan ("Law & Order SVU," "Blue Bloods," "One Life to Live") as Edmund; Miguel Perez ("9-1-1," "The Goldbergs," "Saved by the Bell") as understudy for Lear and Gloucester; Stanley Jackson (And In This Corner: Cassius Clay) as understudy for Edgar/King of France and Edmund; and Danielle Thorpe ("Star Trek: Picard," "Power") as understudy for Cordelia/Fool, Regan, and Goneril.

Morton, following his award-winning, sold-out performance as Dick Gregory in *Turn Me Loose*, returns to The Wallis in the title role of Shakespeare's tragedy as a man who has brought his country through turmoil, but at what cost? Forced to grapple with violent power struggles and a dysfunctional family, Lear wrestles with the betrayal of his two older daughters who, have banished him to the wilderness, and his own betrayal of his youngest daughter, exiled for the sin of honesty. Turbulence and fury combine to turn a skilled geopolitical master into a dazed, naked wanderer, exposed to the elements.

Of this timeless tale of truth, love, and power, with a glimpse of redemption, director Rubin says, "By immersing the audience in a future of looming environmental apocalypse, where identity is fluid, and salvation can only be found through self-knowledge, our *King Lear* confronts us with a looming apocalypse which is the America – indeed the world – we must strive to avoid."

Audience members are encouraged to wear light-colored clothing for each performance to enhance the production design which will be projected throughout the entire auditorium.

Paul Crewes, the Wallis' former Artistic Director is Creative Producer. Dramaturgical Consultant is Morgan Jenness, known for work at The Public Theater under both George C. Wolfe and Joseph Papp in roles ranging from literary manager to Director of Play Development to Associate Producer of the New York Shakespeare Festival. The production team, comprised of an extraordinary range of creative artists, includes Ursula Kwong-Brown and Danny Erdberg as Composers/Sound Designers, both with international credits and making their debuts at The Wallis. Broadway, national, and international award-winning Steven Strawbridge is Lighting Designer and Tony® Award-winner Chris Barreca is Scenic Designer. X Hill, known for her surrealistic and experimental designs and her work at REDCAT, is Costume Designer. Los Angelesbased media artist and video designer Keith Skretch is Projection Designer. CSA six-time Artios Award-winner Amy Lieberman is Casting Director; The Wallis' Programming Manager, Camille Jenkins, is Assistant Director; and Taiwanese set and production designer Chun-Wei Wang is Assistant Scenic Designer. Shawna Voragen is Production Stage Manager, and Jenny Park is Assistant Stage Manager.

"John Gould Rubin, Paul Crewes, and I, formed a very powerful and successful collaboration around Turn Me Loose, during which, we began discussing King Lear as a play that throws into stark relief two very highly dysfunctional families, a world in which mankind inexorably effects nature, where old age is vulnerable to cruelty, and the imperceptive conflict between fatherhood and royalty is an incompatibility that becomes a tempest of madness and desolation," says Morton. "John, Paul, and I are full of expectation, excitement, and energy as we begin this next chapter of our partnership."

John Gould Rubin (director), Artistic Director of The Private Theater, for which he directed a site-specific Hedda Gabler, a radical deconstruction of Strindberg's Playing With Fire at The Box and Rocco, Chelsea, Adriana, Sean, Claudia, Gianna, Alex at HERE; and former co-Artistic and Executive Director of LAByrinth, for which he directed 7 plays including premieres by John Patrick Shanley and Erin Cressida Wilson. He's directed throughout NYC at Rattlestick (Little Doc, with Adam Driver), Ma-Yi, and The Public among others, notably: Turn Me Loose (w/Joe Morton) at The Westside (nominated Best Director Jos. Callaway Award/SDC), The Wallis, and Arena Stage in DC; Peer Gynt at The International Ibsen Festival in Oslo, Norway, Queen For A Day (w/David Proval & Vinnie Pastore off-Broadway,) The Cherry Orchard (w/Ellen Burstyn at The Actor's Studio,) American Buffalo (w/Treat Williams and Stephen Adly Guirgis.) Paul Crewes (Creative Producer) was named the Wallis Annenberg Center for the Performing Arts' first Artistic Director in 2015, and he guided the Beverly Hills performing arts venue artistically to a new level of prominence until stepping down in December 2021. Each season, he brought an eclectic mix of local, national and international artists and companies to The Wallis' stages in theater, dance music and film. Over the years, The Wallis produced many works of theater, with *King Lear* being Crewes' final production of his tenure for the venue. Prior to joining The Wallis, Crewes was, for twelve years, Chief Executive and Executive Producer of Kneehigh Theatre, the internationally recognized U.K. company. He brought Kneehigh's *Brief Encounter*, a "stunning, first-rate" production combining film with theater and adapted/directed by Emma Rice, to The Wallis for its inaugural 2013/2014 Season. He also worked throughout the U.K. in Producer and Executive Producer roles at The Lowry, Phoenix Dance Theatre, Crewes Gale Productions, which he formed, and West Yorkshire Playhouse (now Leeds Playhouse). He worked in the producing departments at Theatre Royal Plymouth, London Contemporary Dance Theatre, Paines Plough-new writing company and Bristol Old Vic, as well as Director of Technical Training at London's Royal Academy of Dramatic Arts (RADA).

Joe Morton (King Lear) is an Emmy® Award winner and recipient of multiple NAACP Image Awards for his role as Rowan/Eli Pope in Shonda Rhimes' critically acclaimed series "Scandal." Currently, Morton can be seen as the wily Teddy Franklin in the FOX drama "Our Kind of People," and as co-host (and co-producer) on "Inside The Black Box," an interactive interview show, on "Crackle TV," which explores the experiences of black artists within the world of entertainment. In film, Morton is widely recognized as the mute alien in the title role of John Sayle's *The Brother from Another Planet*, and as the ill-fated scientist, Miles Dyson, in *Terminator 2: Judgment Day*. Morton was last seen as Cyborg's dad, Dr. Silas Stone, in *Batman vs. Superman*, and Zack Snyder's Cut of *Justice League*. Morton debuted on Broadway in *Hair*, and received a Tony® nomination and Theatre World Award for his portrayal of Walter Lee Younger in *Raisin*. His Off-

Broadway portrayal of comedian/civil-rights activist, Dick Gregory, in *Turn Me Loose*, earned him the Off-Broadway Alliance, the AUDELCO, the LA Critics Circle, and the prestigious Lucille Lortell Award, for Outstanding Lead Actor in a play.

River Gallo (Cordelia/Fool) (they/them) is a GLAAD award-winning Salvadoran-American filmmaker, actor, writer, model and intersex advocate. They are the writer, director, and star of the short film *PONYBOI* which premiered at the 2019 Tribeca Film Festival and was executive produced by Stephen Fry and Emma Thompson. *PONYBOI* is the first narrative film created by and starring an out intersex person in cinema history. Recently, Gallo starred in an episode of "Love, Victor" on Hulu. They have modeled for Abercrombie and Fitch, Maison Margiela, and was one the "Faces of NYC Pride" 2019. Gallo won a GLAAD Rising Star Media Award, was named one of the "Most Exciting Queer People to Follow" by Out Magazine, and was featured in a *HUNGER* magazine spread. Gallo is currently developing *PONYBOI* into a feature at Drake's production company 30,000 FT., with actor Ezra Miller attached as producer.

Zach Solomon (Edgar/King of France) is thrilled and humbled to be joining this production under the direction of John Gould Rubin, performing alongside such an incredible cast. Originally from Atlanta, Solomon got his start acting when his mother forced him to audition for his 4th grade production of *Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat*, in which he played the titular role of Children's Chorus Member Number 21. He received his BFA in acting from NYU Tisch and the Stella Adler Studio of acting and continued his on camera training with Anthony Abeson, Vance Barber, Lesly Kahn, and Joel Johnstone. He recently wrapped shooting Pamela Adlon's "Better Things" on FX, playing the role of Push.

Brie Eley (Regan) is thrilled to make her Wallis debut with *King Lear*. This marks her return to classical theater after studying at the British American Drama Academy in Oxford and performing Viola in *Twelfth Night* (Kings County Shakespeare). Theater highlights include Skylight Theatre, The Classical Theatre of Harlem, The Kennedy Center, and two world premieres at the Humana Festival of New Plays. Recent TV: "The Rookie," "9-1-1," "The Goldbergs," "Saved by the Bell" (peacock). As a content-creator in the sketch-comedy world, she's performed throughout Los Angeles, and screened her original content at NBC Universal's Short Cuts and Austin Comedy Festival, among others. Eley is also the founder of Here and Ready, a networking collective for Black actresses that programs enrichment seminars, casting workshops and supports more than 1,200 members nationwide. She is a proud native of Sugar Land, Texas, and HSPVA graduate. For Dad, a true king.

Emily Swallow (Goneril) is thrilled to be back on the stage after appearing with Joe Morton in 2018's LA Shakespeare Center Production of Henry IV, Parts 1&2. Previous LA theater includes Ovation-award-winning productions of Molly Smith Metzler's Cry it Out (Echo Theater), Ayad Akhtar's Disgraced (Mark Taper Forum) and Donald Marguiles' The Country House (Geffen Playhouse).
