American Pianist Jonathan Biss Ushers in New 2017/18 Season on October 8

The Wallis presents a wide assortment of programming encompassing Chamber Music, Solo Recital, Opera, Jazz, American Songbook and Broadway

(Beverly Hills, CA August 31) World-renowned pianist, writer and lecturer **Jonathan Biss** is known for tackling demanding repertoire such as Beethoven's fiery "Tempest" and Schumann's unparalleled Fantasie in C Major, arguably the composer's greatest work for solo piano. On Sunday, October 8, Biss will make his debut at the **Wallis Annenberg Center for the Performing Arts (The Wallis)** in Beverly Hills performing both of these significant works, as well as Mozart's Sonata in A minor and Leon Kirchner's *Interlude II*, which was written specifically for Biss by the composer. Mr. Biss is a Steinway Artist, and this concert is made possible by generous support from Susan and Peter Strauss.

This marks the first of fifteen **Music @The Wallis** concerts to be performed this season. Biss will be followed by the return of Harlem Quartet on October 15 and Kyle Riabko on November 10 and 11. Music @ the Wallis will continue later this season with pianist Jeremy Denk; the Berlin Philharmonic Wind Quintet with pianist Stephen Hough; the Zurich Chamber Orchestra with violinist Daniel Hope; the adventurous LA-based ensemble wild Up; Grammy Award-winner Arturo Sandoval's curated jazz weekend; Matthew Aucoin's *Crossing* in Concert, a co-production with LA Opera Off Grand; violinist Sarah Chang with pianist Julio Elizalde; Ory Shihor, who will perform Schubert's last three piano sonatas; Broadway's Seth Rudetsky, who will perform with special guests in February and March; the return of Tony, Oscar and Grammy Award-winning composer Stephen Schwartz; and Nathan and Julie Gunn celebrating the American Songbook and *Leonard Bernstein at 100*.

"We are thrilled to launch an extraordinary season of Music @ The Wallis with acclaimed pianist Jonathan Biss, who will most certainly take full advantage of the intimacy and exceptional acoustics of our Bram Goldsmith Theater," said Paul Crewes, The Wallis' Artistic Director. "This season features a full range of diverse musical programming, from our own L.A.-based organizations to international artists, offering everything from classical, contemporary, Broadway, jazz, and more."

This season, Music @ The Wallis will enhance the audience experience once again with **Preludes** @ **The Wallis**, a free pre-concert conversation with artists and special guests one hour prior to each performance. Classical KUSC's Brian Lauritzen will discuss each program on the Bram Goldsmith Theater stage allowing attendees a deeper dive into the evening's music while offering a complimentary glass of wine courtesy of The Henry Wine Group.

About Jonathan Biss:

Jonathan Biss is a world-renowned pianist who shares his deep musical curiosity with classical music lovers in the concert hall and beyond. In addition to performing a full schedule of concerts, he has spent eleven summers at the Marlboro Music Festival and written extensively about his relationships with the composers with whom he shares a stage. A member of the faculty of his alma mater the Curtis Institute of Music since 2010, Biss led the first massive open online course (MOOC) offered by a classical music conservatory, *Exploring Beethoven's Piano Sonatas*, which has reached more than 150,000 people in 185 countries. Part 3 is set to come out in January 2018, and he will continue to add lectures until he covers all the sonatas.

This season Biss continues his latest Beethoven project, *Beethoven/5*, for which the Saint Paul Chamber Orchestra is co-commissioning five composers to write new piano concertos, each inspired by one of Beethoven's. The five-year plan began with Biss premiering Timo Andres's "The Blind Banister," a finalist for the Pulitzer Prize in Music, which was followed by Sally Beamish's "City Stanzas" last season. This fall with the Saint Paul Chamber Orchestra he premieres Salvatore Sciarrino's "Il Sogno di Stradella," paired with Beethoven's Piano Concerto No. 4, and goes on to play it with the Cleveland Orchestra later in the year. The first two commissions continue to have a life, with "The Blind Banister" at the Jacksonville and New World symphonies and Beamish's "City Stanzas" at the BBC Philharmonic, Orchestre de chambre de Paris, and Swedish Chamber Orchestra, highlighting Biss's commitment to building the repertoire. In the final two years of the project he will premiere concertos by Caroline Shaw and Brett Dean.

In addition to his involvement at Marlboro, Biss spent the summer of 2017 continuing his complete Beethoven piano sonata performance cycles at the Aspen and Ravinia festivals, which he also begins at the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra this season. Audiences will be able to experience all the piano sonatas in seven concerts over several years. In early 2018 Biss tours with Midori and Antoine Lederlin across Switzerland, Germany, and England, and with the Saint Paul Chamber Orchestra in California.

Biss has embarked on a nine-year, nine-disc recording cycle of Beethoven's complete piano sonatas, and in early 2018 he releases the seventh volume, including the sonatas Op. 2, No. 2; Op. 49, No. 2; Op. 31, No.2 ("Tempest"); and Op. 109. Upon the release of the fourth volume, *BBC Music Magazine* said, "Jonathan Biss will surely take his place among the greats if he continues on this exalted plane." His bestselling eBook, *Beethoven's Shadow*, describing the process of recording the sonatas and published by RosettaBooks in 2011, was the first Kindle Single written by a classical musician. The recording cycle will be complete in 2020, at the same time as the final Coursera lectures on the sonatas.

Biss represents the third generation in a family of professional musicians that includes his grandmother Raya Garbousova, one of the first well-known female cellists (for whom Samuel Barber

composed his Cello Concerto), and his parents, violinist Miriam Fried and violist/violinist Paul Biss. Growing up surrounded by music, Biss began his piano studies at age six, and his first musical collaborations were with his mother and father. He studied at Indiana University with Evelyne Brancart and at the Curtis Institute of Music with Leon Fleisher.
