Epithalamium and **He Loved him Madly** from *Thief in the Interior* by Phillip B. Williams, Alice James Books, 2016

According to Williams, "I wrote *Epithalamium* in response to the celebration of the legalization gay marriage, considering how the act of getting married dwelled in a space of ambivalence: it both protected a love with legal rights regarding medical and property decisions between partners, but not the bodies/personhoods of those who got married. There is still much work to do and I am not against the idea that gay marriage is a step forward. But for those who cannot choose marriage or who can but who live in places where their coupling can put them in more danger we have to resist complacency and reject insensitivity to critiques of gay marriage being the end-goal. *He Loved Him Madly* is a partial (15-section) pecha kucha for my father, Calvin Ford, and uses titles from Miles Davis compositions (odd-number stanzas) and various Hip Hop and spoken word tracks (even-number stanzas). In order of appearance, artists of the evennumber stanzas are Boogie Down Productions, Jay-Z, The Notorious B.I.G., Amiri Baraka, Wu-Tang Clan, Scarface, and Nas. A pecha kucha is a Japanese business presentation form Terrance Hayes converted into a poetic form that typically has twenty sections to explore a particular topic, the subheadings for each topic acting as guides through the possibilities/themes/etc covered in the poem. Mine explores the intersection of my father's battle with addiction and living life during the "war on drugs" and crack epidemic."
